An elephant's trunk is a useful tool that serves many purposes. Some of these purposes are for survival, and some of these purposes are just for fun. An elephant's trunk has more than 40,000 muscles and tendons, making it very sensitive. It can weigh as much as 400 pounds, and has 1 or 2 "fingers" on the end that can be used to grab small objects. The trunk can be used to collect water so the elephant can give himself a shower. It can also be used to grab the freshest leaves from the highest heights, or to chase away pesky flies. An elephant even uses its trunk to hug other elephants! Finally, an elephant can use its trunk like a snorkel to walk underwater and still breathe. An elephant's trunk is truly an amazing tool.

Many of the world's largest cities grow along rivers, coastlines, and other waterways.
